"The big hand is almost at the 9!....I wonder what Shane (a brother) would do if I slashed a line through the goat he just drew?...."

Stifled laughter and short jabs thrown by younger brothers indicated things were getting squirrelly on the hard wooden benches of our little church. As a seven or eight-year-old boy, the message coming from the pulpit was entirely uninteresting to me. I was bored and couldn't wait to spend the afternoon with my friends. Suddenly I sensed the arrival of an authoritative and

large thumbnail squeezing the back of my earlobe into an equally large index finger. All thoughts of afternoon activities vanished as I suddenly found myself staring straight ahead and hoping my left earlobe still wanted to remain a part of my body. We didn't have children's church when I was a kid and it wasn't because we were more inclined to enjoy "big people church." I found sermons about as interesting as math class....which is to say that they didn't interest me very much. (And this, by the way, is no reflection on our preachers.) For reasons I didn't understand at the time, Mom and Dad wanted to engage what was being said.

Mom took notes, both had their Bibles open, and neither was in the mood to have me mess up whatever it was they had going.

I suddenly found myself staring straight ahead and hoping my left earlobe still wanted to remain a part of my body.

I observed similar patterns of odd behavior from other adults in church. My grandparents, whom I loved and believed were intelligent, seemed to think what

Prayer Bible Study Availability


For prayer, we have been getting into pairs or small groups and praying for ourselves, our world, and our unsaved friends / family.

was happening was important. In addition to them, there were uncles and aunts and parents of my friends. It was rare for any of them to miss a Sunday morning. They valued the church. They valued the activities of the church. They valued the music and sermons; it was evident in their engagement. O, sometimes after a long week, I'd catch one of them drifting into another... less engaged dimension of consciousness. None-the-less, the weekly rhythm of worshiping together was ingrained in my being from the time I was born... and for that I am grateful. I am also grateful my opinion of church as a 7-year-old wasn't overly important to the adults in my life. They knew better than I did what was important to my development as a person and son of the Father.

Several weeks ago I was struggling to maintain order in my own burgeoning flock of restless, squirrelly children. One of the children was causing a disruption. I addressed the issue and turned my thoughts and attention back to singing. Finally, my mind could engage and we could get back to worship. Suddenly I felt a soft tapping on my elbow. "O boy, what now?" I thought. The child I had just corrected was looking up at me with bright eyes and motioning me down so that he could whisper something very important in my ear. "Dad, China is on the other side of the world, right!" "...Yes son, it is" I replied. "Its time to sing now." Trust me, I have the most spiritual children in our church.

I have been tempted on more than one occasion to suggest that our church have children's church every Sunday for the entire morning. I fantasize about worship uninterrupted by little people who need things or cause disturbances. The inclination is perhaps a little stronger for me. Trying to pray or preach a sermon after settling a dispute in the pews is not high on my list of "Things I love about being a pastor/dad." There are, however, critical lessons my children are learning by not always being shoveled away to a special children's service. They learn by observation that mom, dad, friends, relatives and other adults they respect, believe our worship time to be an important part of their lives. More is caught than taught as they witness the authority figures in their lives regularly gather

together around a shared faith in worship. And even though the sermon might not always connect with them, they learn practical spiritual principles like respect and reverence, which are about as enticing to 7-year-olds as a steaming dish of broccoli. They are, however, just as necessary as that steaming dish. They learn that their faith is somehow much...much bigger and all encompassing than the brightly colored cartoon

themed Sunday school lessons they love to participate in. This is no knock on Children's ministry curriculum, but our kids need the grown up stuff they can't completely understand yet. They have to know there is more and worshipping with adults helps them come to terms with this truth.

The list of benefits doesn't just end with the kids. Knowing the children are going to be sitting with us my wife through a worship service has inspired Sarah and me to communicate ahead of time with our children about our expectations for them in the service. The ironies of using phrases like "worshiping God," "amputated buttocks," and "no more movies for the rest of your life" in the same sentence are not lost on me. Intergenerational worship forces conversations that have ultimately made us better parents...I hope.

I want my kids to feel like the church is a place for them. I also want them to be a part of a community of faith that isn't primarily geared around their wants. They need to see adults they know and love worshipping together, bearing witness to our King. One body at one time, declaring God's faithfulness from generation to generation. If this is happening, I'm ok getting asked about China from time to time.


Lately we have also really been evaluating our lives using the "Four Chair Discipleship" model and book.

This strategy lays out different stages of our personal walk with Christ as four different chairs. As a youth group, it's obvious that everyone is in a different place in our walk with Christ, so, we place ourselves in the chair we believe we belong in and work to move up to the next chair.

Personally, I was in Chair Two for most of my life until this year. Chair Two is living out your faith inside of your comfort zone, being satisfied with the basics and not craving more. I didn't put my faith into action or share my faith with others. The first time I shared my faith with an unbeliever was last year on our missions trip: "Lead THE Cause" based in Chicago, Illinois. In Chicago my heart was broken for unbelievers. I now understand that we hold the key to eternal life, and a worldly life spent in God's love. For anyone who is confused about this "Four Chair Discipleship" strategy and terminology, a quick explanation is that it is a discipleship multiplication strategy that simply helps understand where people are at in their walk with Christ, and how to move them further towards the life that Jesus has for each of us.

Chair One is an "unbeliever" who doesn't know Jesus. Chair Two is a believer (and they really have put their faith in Christ), but they are content to simply believe. Chair

Three is a "worker" and they become passionate about truly walking out their faith. They are willing to get outside of their comfort zone and actually do the good works that God has prepared in advance for us to do. Chair Four is a "disciple-maker", and it is the good and natural end result of spending years as a worker instead of simply being a believer.

One of our main goals for this year is to move students from Chair Two to Chair Three, but our ultimate goal is to see students move all the way from Chair One to Chair Four... like Christ did.
