Message Overview:

- One of the **CONDITIONS** for answered prayer is you have to have FAITH.
- BUT sometimes the situation is so big and the problem is so overwhelming it's hard to have faith.
- The QUESTION is HOW do you get faith in a faithless situation?
- Romans 10:17 (NASB)
 - ¹⁷ So **faith** comes from **hearing**, and **hearing** by the **word** of Christ.
- "word" = rhema (Greek) a special kind of "word" of God.
- God speaks to people in TWO WAYS (God's "word" = logos or rhema)
 - (1) <u>UNIVERSALLY</u> to <u>EVERYBODY</u> (logos).
 - (2) <u>PERSONALLY</u> to <u>INDIVIDUAL PEOPLE</u> through <u>SPECIFIC</u>
 MESSAGES for SPECIFIC SITUATIONS at SPECIFIC TIMES (rhema).

- OPEN IT -
 - When you come to God asking for help what typically do you say?
- EXPLORE IT –

So that we might understand better how to pray about our problems and difficult situations, let's look at the prayer of Jonah (Read – Jonah 2) and use the following questions as a guide in praying through your problems.

- 1. Why does Jonah need help?
- **2.** What caused the problem (personal or corporate sin; emotional, spiritual or political enemies)?
- 3. How does Jonah in prayer approach the Lord with his problems?
- **4.** Do you see any movement or development in Jonah's prayer?
- **5.** What facts about God and Jonah's relationship with God does Jonah count on as he prays?
- **6.** Does Jonah see any indication that his prayer will be answered? When? How?
- **7.** List two or three specific principles you can incorporate into your own prayer life from studying Jonah's prayer.

APPLY IT –

- 1. What troubling problem or fear do you need to turn over to God?
- 2. What promises of God can help you deal with the difficult circumstances of your life?
